## TEXAS HUNTING ACCIDENT PROFILE

- Violated a cardinal rule of hunter safety
- Anglo male; 29 years of age (average)
- Hunted deer with rifle; hog with handgun/rifle; or dove/quail with shotgun
- Was **not** under the influence of alcohol
- Did not attend a hunter education (safety) course or program
- Did not wear any type of hunter orange clothing
- Was situated in or around vehicle
- Sustained a non-fatal injury
- If not self-inflicted – swung shotgun on game outside of safe zone of fire
- Had over 10 years of hunting experience
- If self-inflicted – handled firearm carelessly in a stand/vehicle; carried loaded firearm in/around vehicle
- Distance of muzzle to wound was within 50 yards, mostly within 10 yards
- Victim was in light to open cover with clear visibility (weather)
- Accident occurred towards dusk; fatigue a factor
- Accident occurred on weekend during September or November



### 2009 Significant Factors

- **Hunting and handling near/from vehicles and careless handling** (lack of muzzle control with loaded firearm) main causes of accidents.
- Rifle incidents up in 2009.
- **January 31** and **November 15** were bad days with three accidents each.
- Fatalities down by three in 2009.
- Slightly more hunter education graduates in the incident data and no reported alcohol use.
- **Self inflicted accidents higher.**
- Number of youngsters involved in accidents was slightly higher.
- **Number of law violations at time of incidents up considerably.**

<b>4-5</b>	Stephens	15/M	Shotgun	Turkey	No	No
<i>Comments:</i>	15-year old shooter and four friends returned from a turkey hunt. While near the friend's truck, he carelessly pointed his shotgun towards the 18-year old victim, safety off. He claims to have dropped the shotgun which discharged, sending pellets through victim's lower left abdomen. Shooter did not have a license. NOTE: Investigation of a homicide in this case is pending.					
<i>Prevention:</i>	Always point muzzle in a safe direction; never walk in front of a muzzle; always unload firearm when not in use; use the proper carry techniques; complete hunter education; obey the law.					
<b>5-17</b>	Throckmorton	62/M	Shotgun	Snake	Yes	No
<i>Comments:</i>	Shooter, who was not a hunter, nor had a license, saw a snake and borrowed his friend's shotgun. He carelessly discharged the gun after he fell down a slope, sending pellets through his upper torso. He apparently was using the gun as a crutch right before the fall. The incident was under investigation, but the medical examiner's report did not prove another motive/cause.					
<i>Prevention:</i>	Always point muzzle in a safe direction; handle firearms carefully; use a proper carry method; always control muzzle if tripping or falling; leave safety mechanism on until firing the shot; unload firearm when not in use; complete hunter education; obey the law.					
<b>10-3</b>	Upshur	30/M	Handgun	Feral Hog	Yes	Yes
<i>Comments:</i>	Shooter and friends were bow hunting hogs and upon game retrieval, shooter put a handgun in his pocket. While putting hogs and gear into truck, the handgun dropped from shooter's pocket and discharged, sending bullet through his lower right abdomen and exiting his shoulder.					
<i>Prevention:</i>	Always point muzzle in a safe direction; handle firearms carefully; use a proper handgun holster and unload firearm when not in use; apply what is learned in hunter education.

<i>Comments:</i>	From his property, shooter shot at a coyote towards the road. A large pellet struck a neighbor in his head. The neighbor was bending over in his front yard at the time.					
<i>Prevention:</i>	Always point the muzzle in a safe direction; always stay within a safe zone of fire; never shoot towards a house, structure, road or domestic animals; be aware of anything that is within the maximum range of the firearms being used; know where others are positioned at all times; complete hunter education or similar training any time you expect to use a firearm.					
<b>1-12</b>	San Augustine	50/M	Rifle	Feral Hog	No	No
<i>Comments:</i>	Shooter and friends were among a pack of hogs and dogs, and in a panic to escape a wounded hog, shooter fired his .30/30 rifle twice, sending bullet/shrapnel into the leg of the victim who was standing near the hog at the time.					
<i>Prevention:</i>	Always point the muzzle in a safe direction; always stay within a safe zone of fire; communicate with hunting companions; know where others are positioned at all times; complete hunter education.					
<b>1-31</b>	Zapata	12/M	Rifle	Deer	Yes	No
<i>Comments:</i>	12-year old shooter carelessly discharged his .243 rifle while pointing it towards his foot. He had taken the safety off, thinking he heard a deer in the brush. He and his father were illegally hunting without landowner consent and walking towards a blind at the time of the incident.					
<i>Prevention:</i>	Always point muzzle in a safe direction; handle firearms carefully and use a two-hand or another proper carry method while hunting; always control muzzle if tripping or falling; leave the safety mechanism on until firing the shot; complete hunter education; obey the law.					

<b>Date</b>	<b>County</b>	<b>Shooter's Age/Gender</b>	<b>Firearm</b>	<b>Animal Hunted</b>	<b>Self-Inflicted?</b>	<b>Hunter Ed? (Shooter)</b>
<b>1-31</b>	Throckmorton	17/M	Rifle	Rabbit	No	Yes
<i>Comments:</i>	Teenage shooter and friends were hunting from a pickup at night, spotlighting for varmints and rabbits. He carelessly discharged his .22 rifle while pointing the muzzle towards the back side roof of the cab. Bullet went through the cab and struck the victim who was sitting on the storage box in the bed of the truck. Bullet struck victim in the arm pit.					
<i>Prevention:</i>	Always point muzzle in a safe direction; never hunt from a moving vehicle even if it is legal; handle firearms carefully; for transport, store unloaded firearm in a secure case separate from ammunition; apply what was learned in hunter education.					
<b>1-31</b>	Lamar	12/M	Rifle	Non-game birds	No	No
<i>Comments:</i>	Young shooter had just returned from hunting with his grandfather and friend. Grandfather had gone inside the house while the shooter attempted to unload a "dud" from his gun. He then carelessly discharged his .22 rifle while pointing it towards his friend's ankle/shin area. Shooter had not completed hunter education and was unaccompanied at the time of the incident.					
<i>Prevention:</i>	Always point muzzle in a safe direction; never walk in front of a muzzle; handle firearm carefully, especially while loading and unloading; always unload firearm when not in use; use the proper carry techniques; complete hunter education; obey the law.					
<b>2-19</b>	Anderson	50/M	Rifle	Deer	Yes	Yes
<i>Comments:</i>	Shooter was preparing to depart his ground stand. As he checked the safety on his .300 caliber rifle, he carelessly discharged it while his wrist laid next the muzzle. The resulting blast through the muzzle break/ported barrel caused damage to his wrist.					
<i>Prevention:</i>	Always point muzzle in a safe direction; treat every firearm as if it is loaded; remember that a safety mechanism is not a substitute for muzzle control; handle and load or unload firearms carefully; apply what was learned in hunter education.					
<b>2-22</b>	Van Zandt	25/M	Rifle	Squirrel	Yes	No
<i>Comments:</i>	Shooter was illegally trespassing, hunting squirrels without a license and without proof of hunter education. He got mud stuck in the muzzle of his .22 rifle while carelessly crossing a fence. Back at his trailer, while attempting to clear the mud from the muzzle, he carelessly discharged the rifle, sending the bullet through the palm of his hand.					
<i>Prevention:</i>	Always point muzzle in a safe direction; treat every firearm as if it is loaded; handle firearms carefully, especially while loading and unloading; unload the firearm immediately after hunting; unload a firearm and control muzzle while cleaning it; complete hunter education; obey the law.					
<b>5-3</b>	Stephens	42/M	Rifle	Turkey	Yes	Yes
<i>Comments:</i>	Shooter carried a loaded .30/30 rifle on his ATV rack. He hit a bump in the road which discharged the rifle, sending the bullet through his right arm operating the steering bar.					
<i>Prevention:</i>	Always point muzzle in a safe direction; never hunt from a moving vehicle even if it is legal; handle firearms carefully; for transport, store unloaded firearm in a secure case separate from ammunition; apply what was learned in hunter education.					
<b>5-25</b>	Anderson	10/M	Rifle	Rabbit	Yes	No
<i>Comments:</i>	Shooter carelessly discharged a loaded towards the victim after the victim has set the rifle against a tree and told the shooter it was unloaded. Bullet struck victim in the knee.					
<i>Prevention:</i>	Always point muzzle in a safe direction; treat every firearm as if it is loaded; handle firearms carefully; control the muzzle and use a proper carry at all times; complete hunter education.					

<b>Date</b>	<b>County</b>	<b>Shooter's Age/Gender</b>	<b>Firearm</b>	<b>Animal Hunted</b>	<b>Self-Inflicted</b>	<b>Hunter Ed. Graduate? (Shooter)</b>
<b>9-3</b>	Runnels	66/M	Shotgun	Dove	No	No
<i>Comments:</i>	Victim was covered by shooter swinging on game outside of his safe zone of fire. Victim was partly hidden behind a mesquite tree and was struck in the back and legs from three pellets. Only the back pellet penetrated the skin. Shooter and victim were illegally hunting over a baited area and were also over their bag limit.					
<i>Prevention:</i>	Always point the muzzle in a safe direction; always stay within a safe zone of fire; communicate with hunting companions; know where others are positioned at all times; apply what was learned in hunter education; obey the law.					
<b>9-3</b>	Burnet	27/M	Shotgun	Dove	Yes	Yes
<i>Comments:</i>	Victim slipped and fell while sitting on the edge of a grounded boat while hunting doves. He carelessly discharged his shotgun with hammer in the cocked position. Pellets struck him behind the ear, causing a 4 to 6-inch open gash/wound.					
<i>Prevention:</i>	Always point muzzle in a safe direction; treat every firearm as if it is loaded; handle firearms carefully; control the muzzle and use a proper carry at all times; always keep hammers in the safe or half cock position until ready to fire a shot; always unload prior to exiting/entering a stand or sitting/prone position; apply what was learned in hunter education.					
<b>9-10</b>	Eastland	30/M	Shotgun	Dove	Yes	Yes
<i>Comments:</i>	Shooter carelessly discharged his shotgun while the muzzle was resting on his toe. He had just jumped into a vehicle with a loaded firearm due to a rain storm that came up.					
<i>Prevention:</i>	Always point muzzle in a safe direction; treat every firearm as if it is loaded; unload when no longer hunting; when transporting a firearm, always make sure it is unloaded and in a case, separate from the ammunition; handle firearms carefully; never set a muzzle of a gun on a toe; apply what was learned in hunter education.					
<b>9-18</b>	Coleman	37/M	Shotgun	Dove	Yes	Yes
<i>Comments:</i>	Victim was struck in the hand by an exploding barrel caused from faulty equipment, ammunition discharge and/or obstruction in barrel. He had fired about ten rounds immediately prior to loading and firing a shot that caused the malfunction.					
<i>Prevention:</i>	Always point the muzzle in a safe direction; use only the correct, matching ammunition; ensure that reloaded ammunition meets proper loading standards; prior to loading observe the inside of the barrel from the breech of a hinge/break open action firearm to determine if there are obstructions in the barrel; apply what was learned in hunter education.					
<b>10-6</b>	Foard	27/M	Rifle	Feral Hog	No	Yes
<i>Comments:</i>	Victim was struck by a bullet that traveled hundreds of yards from a rifle fired by the shooter who was hunting illegally from a vehicle/public road at hogs, while staring into a rising sun.					
<i>Prevention:</i>	Always point muzzle in a safe direction; be aware of the foreground and backstop prior to shooting; be aware of other hunters within the maximum range of the firearms being used; when transporting a firearm, always make sure it is unloaded and in a case; apply what was learned in hunter education; obey the law.					
<b>10-10</b>	Smith	22/M	Handgun	Feral Hog	Yes	No
<i>Comments:</i>	Shooter carelessly discharged his loaded 45 cal. handgun while retrieving it from his holster. The bullet entered his thigh and exited through his lower leg. Shooter was illegally hunting without a license and had not completed the required hunter education training.					
<i>Prevention:</i>	Always point muzzle in a safe direction; unload when no longer hunting; when transporting a firearm, always make sure it is unloaded and in a case, separate from the ammunition; carry holstered handguns with an empty chamber while hunting; complete hunter education; obey the law.					



<b>Date</b>	<b>County</b>	<b>Shooter's Age/Gender</b>	<b>Firearm</b>	<b>Animal Hunted</b>	<b>Self-Inflicted</b>	<b>Hunter Ed. Graduate? (Shooter)</b>
<b>10-29</b>	Burnet	56/M	Rifle	Feral Hog	Yes	Yes
<i>Comments:</i>	Shooter carelessly discharged a loaded rifle while sitting in his elevated stand hunting hogs. He claimed that the floor gave way and that the rifle fell towards him at the time of the incident.					
<i>Prevention:</i>	Always point muzzle in a safe direction; treat every firearm as if it is loaded; control the muzzle at all times -- even while falling; set firearm against a secure rest; ensure that the safety is on until shooting at game; inspect elevated stands for wear and fix worn parts prior to hunting from them; apply what was learned in hunter education.					
<b>11-8</b>	Brooks	17/M	Rifle	Peccary	No	No
<i>Comments:</i>	Shooter was illegally hunting without proof of hunter education and carelessly discharged the rifle while shooting from a moving vehicle. Person driving the vehicle applied the brakes as the shooter was firing at javelina, causing shooter to point the muzzle towards the victim standing next to him in the bed of the pickup. Bullet entered/exited the arm of the victim.					
<i>Prevention:</i>	Always point the muzzle in a safe direction; never hunt from a vehicle; when transporting a firearm, always make sure it is unloaded and in a case, separate from the ammunition; complete hunter education; obey the law.					
<b>11-12</b>	Panola	39/M	Rifle	Deer	No	No
<i>Comments:</i>	Shooter used the roll bar on his ATV as a gun rest and carelessly discharged it as the muzzle lay immediately behind a portion of the rest. Victim, who was kneeling beside the ATV at the time of the incident, was struck by bullet fragments to the neck and upper torso area.					
<i>Prevention:</i>	Always point muzzle in a safe direction; unload when no longer hunting; when transporting a firearm, always make sure it is unloaded and in a case, separate from the ammunition; never hunt from a vehicle; complete hunter education.					
<b>11-14</b>	Hunt	53/M	Shotgun	Quail	No	No
<i>Comments:</i>	Non-hunting victim was covered by shooter swinging on flushing quail outside of a safe zone of fire. Victim was hot and had gone back to vehicle and removed his orange vest. He returned, toward the group, without the orange vest and was struck in the upper arm from the shot.					
<i>Prevention:</i>	Always point the muzzle in a safe direction; always stay within a safe zone of fire; communicate with hunting companions, especially if coming up from behind others; know where others are positioned at all times; complete hunter education.					
<b>11-15</b>	Jack	49/M	Rifle	Deer	No	No
<i>Comments:</i>	Shooter and victim were exiting an elevated stand with a loaded .30-06 rifle. Shooter carelessly discharged it towards the victim's foot, right after she passed the gun down to him from above.					
<i>Prevention:</i>	Always point the muzzle in a safe direction; treat every firearm as if is loaded; always unload firearm when not in use, especially before entering/exiting a stand; complete hunter education.					
<b>11-15</b>	Terry	20/M	Rifle	Coyote	Yes	No
<i>Comments:</i>	Shooter was illegally hunting without a hunting license or proof of hunter education. He had seen a coyote and his friend had stopped the vehicle. After quickly loading his .30-30 lever action rifle, he carelessly discharged it towards his foot while exiting the vehicle.					
<i>Prevention:</i>	Always point muzzle in a safe direction; unload when no longer hunting; when transporting a firearm, always make sure it is unloaded and in a case, separate from the ammunition; never hunt from a vehicle; complete hunter education; obey the law.					

<b>Date</b>	<b>County</b>	<b>Shooter's Age/Gender</b>	<b>Firearm</b>	<b>Animal Hunted</b>	<b>Self-Inflicted</b>	<b>Hunter Ed. Graduate? (Shooter)</b>
<b>11-15</b>	McMullen	16/M	Shotgun	Waterfowl	Yes	No
<i>Comments:</i>	Shooter was crawling through the grass with a loaded shotgun, safety off. He carelessly discharged it as it was pointed towards his own knee.
