




STATE PARK

San Angelo State Park comprises over 7,700 acres of West Texas rangeland bordering O.C. Fisher Reservoir and the North Concho River just outside San Angelo. Both water and land recreational activities are available. The diverse plant and animal life provides good opportunities for wildlife viewing. The park also contains historic features, including petroglyphs, prehistoric animal tracks from the 250-million-year-old Permian Period, a mastodon fossil site, a mysterious 1847 grave site, bison herd and the largest herd of official State of Texas longhorns. Public hunts for deer, dove, quail and turkey take place annually.



- Group Shelters: Chaparral and North Concho Pavilions are large covered shelters with concrete floors, picnic tables and electricity.
- Boating: Boat ramps provide access to the reservoir.

 Fishing: From bank or boat for bass, catfish and crappie.
- Swimming: Unsupervised swimming and wading permitted.
- Trails: 50 miles of developed trails for hiking, mountain biking and equestrian use. Orienteering course is available.
- Wildlife Watching: 300 species of birds checklist available upon request; 50 species of mammals and reptiles, including horned lizard.
 - **Guided Tours:** Special interpretive programs are scheduled and available upon request for the longhorns, bison, petroglyphs and prehistoric sites.
