Amarillo Highlights

Globally, 445 cities from 47 countries participated in the 2022 City Nature Challenge. Amarillo ranked #200 for Observations, #217 for Species, and #212 for Observers globally, placing it in the top 50% for these categories.



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Cumulative Impact

35% of the observations recorded during the City Nature Challenge in the Amarillo metro area were **Research**Grade - observations of wild organisms with photo or sound vouchers of a quality to merit a species-level identification by the majority of identifiers.
