

STATE HISTORIC SITE

Washington-on-the-Brazos State Historic Site is revered as the site of the signing of the Texas Declaration of Independence on March 2, 1836, and as one of the capitals of the Texas Republic. Today the park contains much of the historic township, a reconstruction of Independence Hall, Barrington Farm, the restored home of Anson Jones (last president of the Republic of Texas), the Star of the Republic Museum, and shaded picnic sites overlooking the Brazos River.



Visitor Center: Exhibits about Texas declaring independence from Mexico.



Museum: Exhibits about the Republic of Texas.



Group Facilities: Two group picnic pavilions (capacity 50 and 100). Auditorium (capacity 400). Reservations required.



Picnicking: Shaded picnic area overlooking river.



Historic Structures: Independence Hall; Barrington, a circa-1850 "living history farm" and the restored home of Anson Jones.




Guided Tours: Call park for rates and reservations.



Trails: Short walking trails.
