Wildlife thrives at Inks Lake State Park, where white-tailed deer roam the campgrounds and brazen raccoons scrounge for food. Wild turkeys, armadillos, foxes and other animals also frequent the park. In addition to the wildlife, visitors enjoy water-related activities at Inks Lake, such as fishing, swimming, boating, sailing and skiing. The park also has more than eight miles of trails. In the spring, bluebonnets, Indian paintbrushes and Indian blankets splash the area with color.



Camping: Campsites with water only or water and electricity. Also primitive sites and limited use cabins.



Group Facilities: Sponsored youth group area (capacity 50). Group picnic pavilion (capacity 25).



Picnicking: Picnic sites with tables and grills.



Swimming: At your own risk in lake.



Boating: Only public boat ramp on lake. Also skiing and sailing.



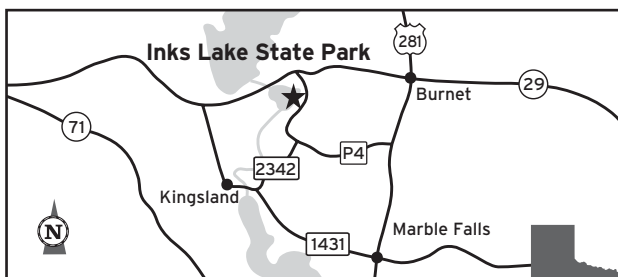
Fishing: Two lighted fishing piers. Possible catches include striped bass, white bass, catfish and sunfish.



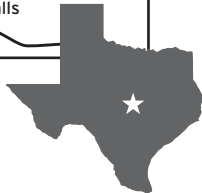
Texas State Park Store: Year-round, staff-operated store with souvenirs and groceries; canoe, kayak and paddleboat rentals.



Trails: More than eight miles of trails wind through hills to scenic vistas and a primitive camping area.



Located in Burnet County, nine miles west of Burnet off Texas 29 on Park Road 4.
