I know CEE in Houston is still suffering on-again, off-again Internet access, so my thoughts are with you all still dealing with the continuing disturbance.

Grants and Awards

Community Outdoor Outreach Program (CO-OP) Grants

The CO-OP grant helps to introduce underserved populations to the services, programs and sites of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. This is not a land acquisition or construction grant; this is only for programs. Grants are awarded to nonprofit organizations, schools, municipalities, counties, cities and other tax-exempt groups. Minimum grant requests are \$5,000 and maximum grant requests are \$50,000. The application deadlines are February 1 and October 1, with awards on April 15 and December 15.

Captain Planet Foundation Grant

Deadlines: March 31, June 30, September 30 and December 31

The [Captain Planet Foundation](#) funds and supports hands-on environmental projects for children and youth ages 6–18. Its objective is to encourage innovative programs that empower children and youth around the world to work individually and collectively to solve environmental problems in their neighborhoods and communities. Grant amounts range from \$250 to \$2,500.

eBook Grants

Sylvan Dell Publishing offers elementary school teachers eBooks, enabling books to be projected for classroom reading. The company is offering resource grants for a one-year site license (school year 2008–2009) providing unlimited access to all Sylvan Dell eBooks, featuring flipviewer technology with selectable English and Spanish text and audio. Each year the PEYA program honors a wide variety of environmental projects developed by young individuals, school classes (kindergarten through high school), summer camps, public interest groups, and youth organizations to promote environmental awareness.

Target Field Trip Grants

Deadline: November 1, 2008

K–12 public, private or charter school are eligible to apply. The [Target Field Trip Grants](#) program is an innovative, no-strings-attached initiative that funds field trips for students nationwide. Five thousand grants of up to \$800 each will be awarded in February 2009.

Grants are provided to applicants throughout the United States. Target Field Trip Grant funds are best used for visits to art, science and cultural museums, community service or civic projects, career enrichment opportunities and other events or activities away from the school facility. Funds may be used to cover field trip-related costs such as transportation, ticket fees, resource materials and supplies.

Intel Community Grants

Deadlines: Quarterly submissions, February 1, May 1, August 1 and November 1
[Intel](#) vigorously supports education through grants for programs that advance science, math and technology education, particularly for women and underserved populations. Intel is also committed to the responsible use of natural resources, and funding for environmental programs will be considered. Within this broad category, Intel continues to give priority to programs with educational and technological components.

American Honda Foundation Grants

[American Honda Foundation Grants](#) are provided in the fields of youth education and science education to the following: educational institutions, K–12; accredited higher education institutions (colleges and universities); community colleges and vocational or trade schools; scholarship and fellowship programs at selected colleges and/or universities, and many other organizations.

Wild Ones is a not-for-profit organization dedicated to the use of natural landscaping with native plant species as an ecologically better alternative to traditional landscaping practices. The program gives monetary grants ranging from \$100 to \$500 to schools, nature centers, or other nonprofit educational organizations to establish outdoor learning centers.

The Braitmayer Foundation

Deadlines: Summer, June 1 and Fall, Nov 15

[The Braitmayer Foundation](#) offers two grant categories: up to \$10,000 and up to \$35,000 to K–12 campuses throughout the United States. Previous recipients received grants for curriculum supplementation, curriculum development incorporating local history, teacher recruitment in math and science, mentoring programs and similar curricular and school reform initiatives. Also included were preparation of and professional development

opportunities for teachers, particularly those which encourage people of high ability and diverse backgrounds to enter and remain in K–12 teaching.

Youth Garden Grants Program

Deadline: 11/1/2008

The [National Gardening Association](#) awards grants to schools and community organizations with child-centered garden programs. Schools, youth groups, community centers, camps, clubs, treatment facilities, and intergenerational groups throughout the United States are eligible. Applicants must plan to garden with at least 15 children between the ages of 3 and 18 years.

Award categories: Fifty (50) programs will receive a \$250 gift card to The Home Depot and educational materials from NGA. Seventy (70) programs will receive a \$500 gift card to The Home Depot and educational materials from NGA. Five (5) programs will receive gift cards valued at \$1000 (a \$500 gift card to The Home Depot and a \$500 gift card to the Gardening with Kids catalog and store) and educational materials from NGA.

All applicants must have a minimum of at least two years' science teaching experience in a K–12 school not including the current school year. To apply for funding, qualified teachers must write a Toyota TAPESTRY proposal according to the proposal requirements.


