TEXAS HUNTING INCIDENT PROFILE

- Violated a cardinal rule of hunter safety
- Anglo male; 29 years of age (average)
- Hunted deer with rifle; hog with handgun/rifle; or dove/quail with shotgun
- Was **not** under the influence of alcohol
- Did not attend a hunter education (safety) course or program
- Did not wear any type of hunter orange clothing
- Was situated in or around vehicle
- Sustained a non-fatal injury

- If not self-inflicted incident was a caused by lack of judgment
- Had over 10 years of hunting experience
- If self-inflicted handled firearm carelessly in a stand/vehicle; carried loaded firearm in/around vehicle
- Distance of muzzle to wound was within 50 yards, mostly within 10 yards
- Victim was in light to open cover with clear visibility (weather)
- Incident occurred towards dusk; fatigue a factor
- Incident occurred on weekend during September or November



2011 Significant Factors

- RECORD LOW for total accidents
- **Fatalities** down by two in 2011
- **Mistaken for Game** incidents up in 2011
- Feral hog incidents highest in 2011
- Incidents involving those **under 40** down; **over 40** significantly up
- Fewer hunter education graduates in the incident data
- Self-inflicted accidents less than 50%
- **Number of alcohol** incidents up in 2011.
