How has being the Lead Warden in the Critical Incident Team enhanced your career as a Texas Game Warden? Being a Texas Game Warden is a career that is certainly unique in the law enforcement world, which brings its own set of challenges and opportunities. Early on I found that many law enforcement experiences we are exposed to can traumatically effect an officer, and that there was a need for a Game Warden Peer Support/Critical Incident Team (CIT). We function as a coping and healing team for the mind. From our humble beginnings of just a few members, we are now almost 50 members strong. Our members have responded to officers that have been involved with line of duty deaths, serious bodily injuries, officer involved shootings, suicides, drownings, active shooters, and a multitude of other ordeals. We are ready to respond for any Texas Parks and Wildlife employee, as well as anyone who might be in need, within our own working communities. Being on the CIT has given me a profound sense of satisfaction to work proudly alongside the men and women on our team. We get to serve our co-workers and communities on a deeper level and be there to help them endure sometimes unthinkable tragedies. As a Game Warden, leading this special team has been my greatest and most rewarding adventure.
